

School Funding in Rindge

How Rindge's Schools Compare

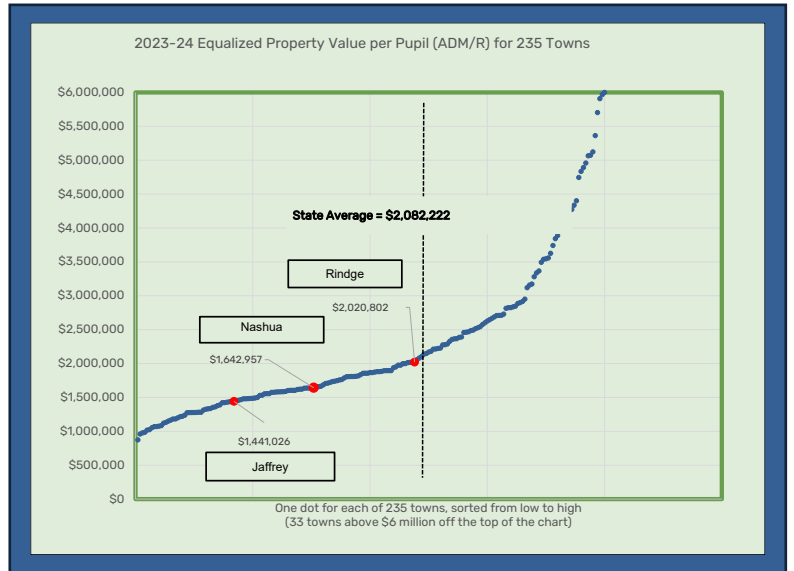
At a Glance:

- Rindge's property-wealth capacity is 97% of the state average.
- Jaffrey-Rindge allocates 32% of its budget to Regular Instruction.
- The average teacher salary in Jaffrey-Rindge is about \$30,000 lower than in Concord.
- Rindge's special education costs are \$9,000 above the state average of \$29,000.

Fairness and Capacity

Fair school funding starts with what each town can reasonably raise for each student. Equalized Property Value per Pupil (EQVP) is the measure of that capacity. It shows, per student, the amount of property wealth available for taxation. Towns with higher EQVP can raise the same school dollars with lower tax rates. Towns with lower EQVP must tax more or settle for less.

In 2024, Rindge had an EQVP of \$2,020,802¹. The statewide average was \$2,082,222, so Rindge had about 97% of the average capacity. When communities have less capacity, local tax rates rise.

Where the Money Goes

An efficient school budget puts the largest share of dollars where students learn. In 2023–24, New Hampshire's public school districts spent \$3.80 billion. Of that total, 38 percent supported regular classroom instruction and 20 percent supported special education. Administration accounted for 11 percent, building operations for 9 percent, and the remainder covered transportation, food services, and other functions.

Rindge's spending mix directs a higher-than-average share to administration and special programs, while allocating a smaller portion to regular instruction and instructional staff support. Rindge spends less in classrooms than the state average².

Compensation and Retention

Keeping experienced teachers requires competitive pay. In 2023–24, Rindge's average teacher salary was \$61,819³, less than the statewide average of \$63,926, and \$30,000 below Concord. In the past 18 years, Rindge's average teacher salary rose 18% while the Consumer Price Index rose 42% and Concord's average pay rose 45%.

Rindge’s starting teacher pay was \$44,350, about 4% more than the state average of \$42,560. Pay that doesn’t keep up with inflation makes it harder to retain mid-career teachers and raises recruitment and onboarding costs.

Special Education

Special education funding is part of how schools support every student’s learning. These dollars pay for specialists, paraprofessionals, transportation, and coordination so classrooms can run on schedule, lessons are accessible, and teachers can maintain whole group instruction while individual support is provided as needed.

In 2023–24, Rindge spent \$8,121,527⁴ on special education. The district served 213 students with IEPs, averaging \$38,129 per student – much more than the state average of \$29,557.

These expenditures are in addition to general education costs and vary by student needs and service intensity from year to year.
